Canadian business gets peek at Tel Aviv U technology, products

TORONTO – A two-day Tel Aviv University (TAU) Technology Showcase Event last week underscored Israel's exceptional scientific creativity and the tremendous opportunities available to Canadian businesses, government and academic institutions interested in building strategic partnerships.

The symposium, From Lab to Market, highlighted Israel's leading-edge technology and products in several fields, including wind turbines, Lithium thin-film batteries, whole cell bio-chips for clean technology and chronic wound-healing discoveries using natural enzymes.

Ze'ev Weinfeld, CEO of Ramot, a wholly owned subsidiary of TAU that manages the transfer of technology from the laboratory to the marketplace, addressed

the audience on its function since 1973 as the commercial arm of the university.

Israeli Trade Commissioner Jonathan Levy mentioned his government's valuable role in supporting technological innovation. More than 110 foreign companies have established research and development centres in Israel, which employ more than 35,000 people.

According to Ehud Gazit, the university's R&D vice president, TAÚ is the largest and most diverse research university in Israel and its research is published regularly in the most respected scientific jour-

TAU scientists delivered presentations on their exciting breakthroughs in several areas.

Professor Illana Gozes, for example, who belongs to the Sackler faculty of medicine and is Chief Scientific Officer of Vancouver-based Allon Therapeutics Inc. (listed on the TSE),

described groundbreaking progress made in the development of treatment for Alzheimer's disease.

"And this is just a small part of the university," Sheldon Potter, incoming president of Canadian Friends of Tel Aviv University, told the Jewish Tribune. "We have a tremendous law school, a world-class international MBA program.... Our film school is one of the best in the world and wins a prize at every single film

Potter is a partner at Fogler, Rubinoff LLP, which hosted the first day of the event; the second day was at the TSX. "We at Canadian Friends see this as a real opportunity," Potter said. "Canada can benefit from the 'innovation capital' of the world, which is Israel.

US, Israel sign alimony agreement

IERUSALEM (Arutz-7) - Justice Minister Daniel Friedmann signed a memorandum of understanding last Thursday with the US, which is intended to fight against slackers from paying alimony by fleeing to the US.

According to the memoran-dum, each country is responsible for collecting alimony from a parent who lives in its country for children who live in another

country. In a case of alimony involving Israeli children, if a parent who is obliged to pay alimony, emigrates to the United States, the Israeli parent can apply to the justice ministry in Israel for assistance in receiving delinquent payment.
